Vaccinating Against Marek's

About the Vaccine

Subcutaneous Vaccine

The most common Marek's vaccine for backyard chickens is the turkey herpesvirus or (**HVT**).

Marek's vaccine costs around \$20/1,000 doses. It can be easily purchased online.

Discard after 2-3 hours.

What You Need

1 ml syringe and 20 gauge needle Reconstituted vaccine Gloves





- 1. Follow instructions that come with the vaccine to **dilute** it.
- 2. Tent the skin on the chickens back
- 3. **Pierce** through the skin. Make sure to **avoid** any bones.

When to Vaccinate

Make sure your birds are vaccinated within 24 hours of hatch.

Other info

Vaccines do not work 100% of the time. Vaccination is only part of the equation for disease control. Practice good husbandry and biosecurity (i.e. prevent your birds from interacting with wildlife and other birds).

And Don't Worry...

Marek's disease is not zoonotic (in other words, you can't catch it!)
